Dr. Vaneet Jishtu, Scientist Incharge for the arboretum interacted with the participants about the role of 'Earth Day' and its importance in the present context, for a better environment ahead. Srinivas Joshi, noted theatre activist from Shimla and also a noted writer, who often writes about Shimla in his column in the Tribune 'Vignettes by Sriniwas Joshi', interacted with the children on the degrading environment of the town. Dr. Jagdish Singh, Head NWFP at HFRI apprised the participants about the Institute and its role in conserving the environment of the region.

Thereafter, there was an interactive session with the famed 'Birdman' Mr. Gautam Prasad Sapkota , from Nepal, who kept the participants in a joyous mood by his amazing bird voices. He mimicked the voices of numerous birds and some animals too and was truly cheered by the children. He enthralled the children with his extraordinary talent. An exhibition of Hill Bamboo products was also displayed, to which the children flocked to view and also buy.
